ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

BEEKMANTOWN CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

JULY 14-15, 1970

The Annual School District Meeting of the inhabitants of Central School District No.1 of the Towns of Beekmantown, Flattsburgh, Chazy and Altona, qualified to vote at such meetings, was held in the Gymnasium of the Main School Building at Beekmantown Corners, New York, on Tuesday, July 14, 1970 at 7:30 P.M.EDST.

The meeting was called to order by Acting Clerk Carol Sanger at 7:32 F.M., who read the official call of meeting as advertised in the Plattsburgh Press-Republican, in accordance with Section 2004 of the State Education Law.

She then announced that in accordance with Section 2026 of the Education Law, the Board of Education had appointed Mr. Dante Santora as Permanent Chairman for the Annual Meeting being held tonight and the meeting for voting to be held between the hours of 1:00 and 9:00 P.M. on Wednesday, July 15, 1970.

She also announced that the Board of Education had also appointed and notified in writing, the following Inspectors of Election for the voting meeting on July 15, 1970, also in accordance with Section 2026 of the Education Law:

He advised everyone present at the meeting that they had been given copies of the proposed budget for the school year 1970-71, and asked for any questions for discussion regarding the proposed budget.

Several questions were raised regarding money in the Capital Fund, money budgeted for physicals for children attending parochial schools, transfers made in the 1969-70 budget, BOCES costs, etc., which were answered and discussed with the group by Superintendent of Schools, George C. Saunders.

Following the discussion, Chairman Santora asked the Clerk for the names of the candidates who had filed petitions for the five year term of office on the Board of Education to fill the vacancies of the expired terms of Joseph Lavorando and Jason Carnright.

The Clerk announced the names of the candidates as follows:

The Chairman then announced that voting on the proposed 1970-71 School Budget and the election of two Board Members for a term of five years would take place on Wednesday, July 15, 1970, between the hours of 1:00 and 9:00 P.M., EDST.

Chairman Santora then explained that anyone who has not registered prior to the meeting July 14, 1970, will not be entitled to vote on that date.

He also stated that if any Special District Meetings are held during the year, registration days will be held prior to each meeting, and that no person shall be entitled to vote whose name does not appear on the School District Register.

Supervision is exercised over subordinate office employees and may be exercised over other non-teaching departments.

EXAMPLES OF WORK: (Illustrative only)

Supervises maintenance of financial accounts and various other records concerned with the business management of the school district; Assists the administration in the development of fiscal policy Oversees the requisitioning and purchasing of all equipment and supplies: Manages school district insurance and investment programs; Complies materials for and assists in the preparation of the annual budget; Prepares and issues periodic local state and federal financial and statistical reports:

Supervises the work of subordinate employees in the business office and trains them in their duties;

May act as clerk to the board of education.

REQUIRED KNOWLEDGES, SKILLS AND ABILITIES: Thorough knowledge of modern business administration procedures and equipment; public personnel practices and budgetary procedures; good knowledge of accounting methods; ability to readily acquire familiarity with the laws, policies, regulations and practices affecting a school district; ingenuity and resourcefulness in handling administrative problems; ability to present written and oral comments and opinions clearly and concisely; ability to plan and supervise the work of others; tact and courtesy; good judgment; thoroughness and dependability; good physical condition.

ACCEPTABLE TRAINING AND EXPERIENCE: Graduation from high school and six years of progressively responsible business administration or accounting experience; or

graduation from a college or university of recognized standing from a four year course for which a bachelor's degree is granted and two years of progressively responsible business administration or accounting experience; or

Dear Dr. Saunders:

As a result of the meeting on June 19, 1970 a recommendation was made that we write the Board of Education applaining the existing situation in the School Nurse-teacher Department.

Increase in enrollment has added greatly to our duties as well as to other departments. We find ourselves functioning at a minimum level in carrying out our School Nurse-teaching role. Some of our expected responsibilities are:

- Health appraisals (physicals) grades K thru 12.
 Also sports physicals for each sport a student plays.
- V. Visual Screening Program:
 Grades X thru 2nd using the Snellen Eye Chart
 with the illiterate E symbol.
 Grades) thru 12 using the New York State Vision
 Tester.
 All 1st Grade pupils are screened for Hyperopia
 as well.
 Sixth graders are screened for color blindness.
- Fure Tone Audiometer (Hearing) Screening Tests: Given to all pupols with recommendation that all second grade pupils have an individual threshold aculty test.

For the above procedures to be accomplished requires scheduling, setting up of equipment, getting the students to and from the office. Then the information is charted on each child's individual health form. Parents are notified of any suspected defect. Later follow-ups are made on those parents we don't hear from either by phone, letter or home visit depending upon the situation.

In addition to our regular responsibilities we are in charge of attendance in all grades. This takes up a major portion of our mornings. We screen junior and senior high students returning to school after an absence. This

entails writing out an admission slip for them for reentry to their classes with reason for absence stated. Phone calls are made on those who are absent for the second consecutive day and those whom we know are chronic absentees. Sometimes home visits are necessary for a prolonged absence when there is no home phone. Other times a principal accompanies us to the home of a chronic absence after phones calls and letters to the parents have failed to be returned to school.

Our effectiveness as school nurse-teachers is vitally affected by being attendance officers as well. Many of these families are the very ones who need counseling but are put on the defensive because we also are checking on their child's legal or illegal absences.

This year there have been problems that needed the andivides attention of an attendance officer.

Some of the other duties our office is responsible for are:

- Census taking—securing personnel, assigning districts, tabulating results and current listing on file for frequent referral for parochial school children.
- Screening applicants for the Free Lunch Program by interview and/or home visits. Notification to the cafeteria and the child's teacher.
- Examption of physically and mentally handicapped children and arrangements for their home teaching.
- 6. First Aid- referral of injuries that we feel need professional care.
- 5. Accident reports- insurance forms
- Up to date list of all physically handicapped students in the district.
- Arranging for clinics:
 Tubarculosis clinic for first, minth and twelfth graders
 - graders
 b) Flu clinic for all school personnel
 c) Any others as state requires

This also includes obtaining permission slips from parents. Reminders are sent to those parents whose children are in used of immunisations.

Another duty we were asked to assume is Health Education for the fifth and sixth grades. In the Main Building when this was first begun, it entailed four fifth grades and three sixth grades in 1965-66. For the school year 1970-71, we are faced with six fifth grades and six sixth grades. This takes the two of us out of the office for 40 minutes each every day. Actually a longer period is spent with the sixth graders because of braveling to and from the bus garage.

To review our day in the Health Office between attendance, Health Education and our other duties we find ourselves feeling quite unaccomplished as School Nurse-Teachers.

This achool year 1969-70 finds us unable to finish in many areas what we feel should have been completed. We foresee the same problems arising in the coming school year.

Therefore we offer these suggestions and recommendations for your consideration during the coming school year.

- 1. Full or part time attendance officer.
- 2. Pull-time clerical help in our office.
- Health Education in the elementary division to be handled by a teacher. We would be glad to act as resource personnel and/or teach certain units.
- Definite need exists for a Health Office in the elementary wing.
- Continuance of assistance in transportation of those students who are excluded from school for lesser health reasons, pediculosis, improper dress, suspension etc.

Careful consideration of our recommendations would be instrumental in allowing us to function at a maximum capacity in our School Nurse-Teacher responsibilities.

Discussion took place regarding assignment of double runs to bus drivers.

Donald Sanger recommended that extra assignments remain as is and that double runs be assigned on the basis of seniority.

There was a feeling that if extra assignments are not limited that some drivers could earn more as a part-time employee working a part day for ten months than some of our twelve-month employees working 50 weeks, eight hours per day.

The Committee recommends that drivers be given four choices of extra driving:

- 1. Double run only \$1,500
- 2. Noon run and a late run \$1,800
- 3. Noon rum and a sport run \$2,000
- 4. Noon run and a city run \$1,250

Seniority for choice was discussed. If a break occurs in service, the committee recommends that a uniform policy be applied for all non teaching personnel.

SUBJECT: Route Assignments for year 70-172

As we discussed bus route assignments for 1970-171 you requested a written description of my proposal for distributing these runs, including the new "double run" and in use for the first time next year.

Definitions:

- 1. Single run- one morning and one afternoon run to either the main building or to the city schools.
- 82. Double run- two morning runs and two afternoon runs. One norming run and one afternoon run will be to the main building and the second a.m. and p.m. run will be either to West Chary or Gumberland Head.
- 3. Hoon run- a bus run made shortly before noon to transport kindergarten children either home from the morning session or into school for the afternoon session.
- 4. Late run- a bus run made approximately 3/4 of an hour after regular dismissal time in the afternoon to transport children home who stayed for the activity period.
- 5. Sport run- a bus run made usually from 5:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. to transport athletes home after practice sessions.

For the first time next year, the new "double runs" will be assigned to 13 drivers. Because these will afford a chance to earn extra money with two short runs morning and afternoon, they will be desirable assignments and sought by nearly every driver. It becomes necessary therefore to establish distipt and equitable guidelines for the distri-

bution of these double runs. My decision is based on:

- 1. acknowledging and rewarding sembrity, and
- following the policy which, although unwritten, has been in effect since centralization that each driver automatically retains all previously assigned runs.

I would start at the top of the attached seniority list and give each driver, in order, a chance for a double run until the 13 runs had been taken. At this point, I would predict we would have reached approximately the dotted line on the attached sheet. It is easily seen that most noon runs are currently driven by the seme drivers who have first chance to choose a double run. This, with their base pay, will enable them to earn a good salary which will be advantageous in their retirement benefits and social security income after retirement.

If these drivers were forced to give up their noon runs in order to take a double run, this would throw all the noon runs down to the newer drivers who now have the late and sport runs and enable them to earn more than the senior drivers.

To summarize: No driver is asked to relinquish a noon run, late run, or sport run currently assigned to him (or to take any loss of salary). The double runs will be effered to the drivers in the order of their position on the seniority list.

This is the method that I have announced to the drivers and my reasons for favoring it. It has generally been accepted

by the majority of drivers. If the Board or Superintendent should consider any alternate plan, let us meet together to discuss all aspects of it.

on Problems of the Health Office

The nurse-teachers related some of the problems confronting them. A recapitulation of their duties was made.

Health screening was discussed, and the conclusion was reached that the task is not as well done as the nurse-teachers would like it to be.

The attendance function connected with the secondary school was discussed in much detail. All pupils returning from absences must report to the health office. Much follow-up is done in cases of truency and illegal absences. Also, any irregularities of attendance during the day are reported to the health office and investigations are often made off school grounds by nurses and the high school administrators.

The possibility of a full or partstime attendance teacher, additional nurse-teachers, paraprofessionals, and more space were discussed at length.

At present the additional space and the hiring of any professionals seem to be impossible for this year (970-71). However, serious consideration of these additions should be given for next year. Ratio of nurse-teachers to students is almost 1:1,000 which is double the number of students per nurse-teachers as recommended by the State Department of Education.

The administration and nurse-teachers will attempt to relieve the load of the health office by reducing the time spent on health teaching in the fifth and sixth grade classes and by streamlining the attendance process if possible. This action may give temporary relief. The Ad Hoc Committee would like to study the problem further and make more definite long-range recommendations to the Board of Education at a later date.

Dear Dr. Saunders:

Thank you for the opportunity to visit the Beekmantown Central School. I enjoyed meeting and talking with you, the administrative staff and the school health program staff.

The school nurse-teachers are to be commended for working so well with such large pupil loads, often found in rapidly expanding districts. They are well-prepared, active and involved. They realize strong administrative support in attempting to solve their own problems.

In view of the observations made during my visit, I would like to make the following recommendations:

- 1. Program priorities must be set. Taking into account the factors as they currently exist, large pupil assignments, few pupil personnel service team memebers, crowded conditions, etc., consideration must be given both to the extra roles assigned to the school nurse-teachers and to the traditional activities assumed by them. The needs of the pupils must be considered and these needs placed in order of importance to educational achievement. At the same time, the talents of the school nurse-teacher staff should be assessed and their meaningful contributions delineated. Is a team approach indicated in the main building? How much should the school nurse-teachers be involved in direct instruction and how much toward inservice education? Which activities will reach the most children and will produce the most change?
- 2. There should be a K-12 health education curriculum developed for Beekmantown Central School, utilizing the school nurse-teachers to plan, implement, and evaluate such a curriculum in an appropriate manner.

Briefly, school nurse-teachers can contribute in the planning stage by working on a curriculum committee, translating the local needs into curriculum, and by conducting inservice programs as needed to strengthen the classroom teacher to meet her responsibility in teaching health at the elementary level.

Implementing the curriculum requires that the school nurse-teacher serve as a consultant to all teachers, as a resource person on materials, or as an instructor as it pertains to the health service activities she conducts, or in other appropriate content areas.

Evaluation of the curriculum can be made in part by the school nurse-teachers measurement and observation of changes in the health status and behavior of the measurement and observation of changes in the nearth states and behavior of the children. This area of the total curriculum, as with others, is never static. All of the above activities are engoing and should take a large portion of the school nurse-teachers time.

My visit was made most pleasant by the hospitality of everyone I met. I hope I both answered some questions and at the same time raised a few. If I can be of service at any time, please do not hesitate to call or write.

REPORT ON PERSONNEL TRANSFERS

At the request of the Board of Education the following report is submitted.

The decision to reassign certain elementary school teachers was made after final registration of kindergarten children was completed on August 21, 1970. The number of kindergarten children at West Chazy did not justify our having a teacher assigned to that position. Following the decision to eliminate the kindergarten class at West Chazy, it was decided to return a section of fifth grade to the West Chazy building to utilize the empty room and to reduce class size in first grade sections at the Main Building.

Mr. Dewey was assigned to the fifth grade section at West Chazy and Mrs. Trudeau was asked to teach the fourth grade class there. Miss Keysor was assigned to the new first grade class and Mrs. Hackett, whose fifth grade class was transferred, was moved to a pre-first grade.

All assignments have worked out well with the exception of some problems being experienced in Mrs. Trudeau's class. Mr. Sears has been working with her on the solutions of those problems. Mrs. Trudeau has revealed to both Mr. Sears and the Superintendent that things have been going much better lately in her group. However, it is felt that the assignment of a new teacher to the group may alleviate the situation and that a transfer of Mrs. Trudeau at this time may help her while minimizing disruption of the youngsters.

Because a question was raised as to the appropriateness of assigning to a fourth grade a teacher who had been teaching at the kindergarten level while also assigning to a pre-first grade class a teacher who had been teaching a fifth grade, an answer is hereby supplied. Teachers are licensed to teach at certain levels and are supposed to be competent to teach at these levels. Both Mrs. Hackett and Mrs. Trudeau are certified in grades K-6. Both had experience in student teaching at the primary and intermediate levels. Rather than transfer teachers from building to building a week before school started a decision was made to change levels of teachers in the same unit. This change was made on the recommendation of the elementary school principal who, it is thought, is the person most familar with the program and staff of his own schools. The fact that he is right in his judgments a great deal more often than he is wrong strongly influences this writer to put faith in his judgment.

Mrs. Trudeau was asked if she would accept the assignment at West Chazy because it meant that she would be starting a new tenure area. Although, she could have taken a kindergarten at Cumberland Head where a new teacher had been hired this year. She chose to remain at West Chazy while expressing an interest in moving to the Main Building next year.

CODE OF ETHICS FOR BEEKMANTOWN CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

A resolution establishing standards of conduct for officers and employees of the Beekmantown Central School District

Be it resolved by the Board of Education of the Beekmantown Central School District as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of section eight hundred six of the general municipal law, the Board of Education of the Beekmantown Central School District recognizes that there are rules of ethical conduct for public officers and employees which must be observed if a high degree of moral conduct is to be obtained and if public confidence is to be maintained in our school district. It is the purpose of this resolution to promulgate these rules of ethical conduct for the officers and employees of the Beekmantown Central School District. These rules shall serve as a guide for official conduct of the officers and employees of the Beekmantown Central School District. The rules of ethical conduct of this resolution adopted, shall not conflict with, but shall be in addition to any prohibition of article eighteen of the general municipal law or any other general or special law relating to ethical conduct and interest in contracts of municipal officers and employees.

Section 2. <u>Definition</u> (a) "Municipal Officer or Employee" means an officer or employee of the Beekmantown Central School District whether paid or unpaid, including members of the Board of Education.

(b) "Interest" means a pecuniary or material benefit accruing to a municipal officer or employee unless the context otherwise requires.

Section 3. Standards of Conduct. Every officer or employee of the Beekmantown Central School District shall be subject to and abide by the following standards of conduct:

- (a) Gifts. He shall not directly or indirectly, solicit any gift; or accept or receive any gift having a value of twenty-five dollars or more, whether in the form of money, services, lcan, travel, entertainment, hospitality, thing or promise, or any other form, under circumstances in which it could reasonably be inferred that the gift was intended to influence him, or could reasonably be expected to influence him, in the performance of his official duties or was intended as a reward for any official action on his part.
- (b) <u>Confidential information</u>. He shall not disclose confidential information acquired by him in the course of his official duties or use such information to further his personal interest.
- (c) Representation before one's own agency. He shall not receive, or enter into any agreement, express or implied, for compensation for services to be rendered in relation to any matter before the Beekmantown Central School District.
- (d) Representation before any agency for a contingent fee. He shall not receive, or enter into any agreement, express or implied for compensation for services to be rendered in relation to any matter before the Beekmantown Central School District, whereby his compensation is to be dependent or contingent upon any action by such agency with respect to such matter, provided that this paragraph shall not prohibit the fixing at any time of fees based upon the reasonable value of the services rendered.

- (e) <u>Disclosure of interest in legislation</u>. To the extent that he knows thereof, a member of the Board of Education and any officer or employee of the Beekmantown Central School District of whether paid or unpaid, who participates in the discussion or gives official opinion to the Board of Education on any legislation before the Board of Education shall publicly disclose on the official record the nature and extent of any direct or indirect financial or other private interest he has in such legislation.
- (f) <u>Investments in conflict with official duties</u>. He shall not invest or hold any investment directly or indirectly in any financial, business, commercial or other private transaction, which creates a conflict with his official duties.
- (g) Private employment. He shall not engage in, solicit, negotiate for or promise to accept private employment or render services for private interests when such employment or service creates a conflict with or impairs the proper discharge of his official duties.
- (h) <u>Future employment</u>. He shall not, after the termination of service or employment with the Beekmantown Central School District, appear before the Board of Education of the Beekmantown Central School District in relation to any case, proceeding or application in which he personally participated during the period of his service or employment or which was under his active consideration.

Section 4. Nothing herein shall be deemed to bar or prevent the timely filing by a present or former Beekmantown Central School District officer or employee of any claim, account, demand or suit against the Beekmantown Central School District, or any agency thereof on behalf of himself or any member of his family arising out of any personal injury or property damage or for any lawful benefit authorized or permitted by law.

Section 5. <u>Distribution of Code of Ethics</u>. The Superintendent of the Beekmantown Central School District shall cause a copy of this code of ethics to be distributed to every officer and employee of the Beekmantown Central School Board within 90 days after the effective date of this resolution. Each officer and employee elected or appointed thereafter shall be furnished a copy before entering upon the duties of his office or employment.

Section 6. <u>Penalties</u>. In addition to any penalty contained in any other provision of law, any person who shall knowingly and intentionally violate any of the provisions of this code may be fined, suspended or removed from office or employment, as the case may be, in the manner provided by law.

Section 7. Effective date. This resolution shall take effect within five days after it is filed as provided in section twenty-seven of the municipal home rule law.

NOTE: The Committee reels that this section should be discussed by the full Board of Education. Section - Nepotism

- (a) <u>Prohibition</u>. No parent, spouse, mindr child or dependent of any officer or employee shall be appointed to any position or employment within the Beekmantown Central School District except where members serving on the staff shall marry each other, neither shall be disqualified by reason of this act.
 - (b) Temporary employment. Notwithstanding the prohibitions provided for by Section (a) above persons may be employed on a temporary pasis for a period not to exceed one year with the approval of the Board of Education.

BEEKMANTOWN CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT BOARD OF ETHICS

A resolution establishing a Board of Ethics.

Be it resolved by the Board of Education of the Beekmantown Central School District as follows:

Section 1. There is hereby established a Board of Ethics consisting of seven members to be appointed by the Board of Education and who shall serve without compensation and at the pleasure of the Board of Education. A majority of such members shall be persons other than officers or employees of the Beekmantown Central School District, but the membership shall include one elected or appointed member of the Board of Education and one member each, selected from the professional and the non-teaching staff of the Beekmantown Central School District.

Section 2. The Board of Ethics shall have the powers and duties prescribed by article eighteen of the general municipal law and shall render advisory opinions to the officers and employees of the Beekmantown Central School District with respect to article eighteen of the general municipal law and any code of ethics adopted pursuant to such article, under such rules and regulations as the board may prescribe. In addition, the board may make recommendations with respect to the drafting and adoption of a code of ethics or amendments thereto upon request of the Board of Education.

Section 3. This resolution shall take effect upon filing within five days as provided in section twenty seven of the general municipal law.

Dear Art:

As you know, part of the Beekmantown Central School District lies within the Town of Plattsburgh and the Collector of Taxes for the Town of Plattsburgh acts as collector for school taxes for the property within the Town of Plattsburgh.

For some time, the Board of Education had been concerned as to whether or not it had obtained a proper coverage by way of an undertaking to insure that there was an undertaking for the amount of taxes collected by the Collector for the Town of Plattsburgh and having a serious question in reference to the law, decided that it would obtain an undertaking. We had been unable to obtain a definite answer from the bonding as to whether or not Beekmantown Central School District could be considered a third party beneficiary as to the taxes collected by the Town of Plattsburgh collector.

The Board of Education has now received an opinion from the Department of Audit and Control and I have been instructed to advise you that the Beekmantown Central School District will no longer maintain the undertaking it has previously obtained, and we would like to know whether or not the amount of undertaking furnished by the Collector for the Town of Plattsburgh would be sufficient to cover the amount of taxes collected by the Collector for the Town of Plattsburgh, which I believe for the year 1970-71, was in the smount of \$586,994.00.

REPORT ON PERSONNEL TRANSFERS

At the request of the Board of Education the following report is submitted.

The decision to reassign certain elementary school teachers was made after final registration of kindergarten children was completed on August 21, 1970. The number of kindergarten children at West Chazy did not justify our having a teacher assigned to that position. Following the decision to eliminate the kindergarten class at West Chazy, it was decided to return a section of fifth grade to the West Chazy building to utilize the empty room and to reduce class size in first grade sections at the Main Building.

Mr. Dewey was assigned to the fifth grade section at West Chazy and Mrs. Trudeau was asked to teach the fourth grade class there. Miss Keysor was assigned to the new first grade class and Mrs. Hackett, whose fifth grade class was transferred, was moved to a pre-first grade.

All assignments have worked out well with the exception of some problems being experienced in Mrs. Trudeau's class. Mr. Sears has been working with her on the solutions of those problems. Mrs. Trudeau has revealed to both Mr. Sears and the Superintendent that things have been going much better lately in her group. However, it is felt that the assignment of a new teacher to the group may alleviate the situation and that a transfer of Mrs. Trudeau at this time may help her while minimizing disruption of the youngsters.

Because a question was raised as to the appropriateness of assigning to a fourth grade a teacher who had been teaching at the kindergarten level while also assigning to a pre-first grade class a teacher who had been teaching a fifth grade, an answer is hereby supplied. Teachers are licensed to teach at certain levels and are supposed to be competent to teach at these levels. Both Mrs. Hackett and Mrs. Trudeau are certified in grades K-6. Both had experience in student teaching at the primary and intermediate levels. Rather than transfer teachers from building to building a week before school started a decision was made to change levels of teachers in the same unit. This change was made on the recommendation of the elementary school principal who, it is thought, is the person most familar with the program and staff of his own schools. The fact that he is right in his judgments a great deal more often than he is wrong strongly influences this writer to put faith in his judgment.

Mrs. Trudeau was asked if she would accept the assignment at West Chazy because it meant that she would be starting a new tenure area. Although, she could have taken a kindergarten at Cumberland Head where a new teacher had been hired this year. She chose to remain at West Chazy while expressing an interest in moving to the Main Building next year. Dr. Saunders reported briefly concerning his meeting Insurance with Paul Jennings of the Education Department about the Report school insurance program. It is felt that our program is in no serious trouble but serious consideration should be given to updating it and asking for quotes from large agencies that would accept all coverage.

REVISED FREE LUNCH POLICY EFFECTIVE OCTOBER 31, 1970

The criteria used to determine eligibility for a family to participate in this program shall be the one required in accordance with the BUREAU OF SCHOOL FOOD MANAGEMENT.

- Requests shall be directed to the school nurse-teacher. Children whose parents have filed such an application shall receive free lunch pending final action. Notification of which shall be in writing.
- The school nurse-teacher "may determine that the children, or certain categories of children automatically meet the school's eligibility standards."
- The parents will be asked to sign a statement pertaining to the validity of the information given.
- A three member committee will meet to discuss and evaluate those cases which do not fall within the established guide lines. The classroom teachers of the children involved would be asked for opinions and observations.
- A hearing procedure will be held by the Superintendent of Schools under which a family can appeal a decision made by the three member committee consisting of principal, school nurse-teacher, and cafeteria manager.
- To receive full free lunch eligibility will be determined by: gross annual income based upon the number in a family. (See attached form.)
- A public release containing the above information shall be made available to the informational media in the area on or about the beginning of each school year.
- 8.
 A standard form will be sent home at periodic intervals to establish continuing eligibility.
- Names of children eligible to receive lunches shall not be published, posted or announced, nor shall there be any overt identification of such children. However, the children will be privately introduced to the cashier, so that she may recognize them as they come through the serving line with paying children in order that she will be able to record the meal.

School district voting qualifications - age

As you know, the United States Supreme Court, on December 21, 1970, handed down a decision relating to the Voting Rights Act Amendments of 1970, Public Law 91-285, 84 Stat. 314, which set the minimum voting age for federal, state and local elections at age 18 effective January 1, 1971.

The Supreme Court upheld the Act with respect to the voting age for federal elections. Therefore, beginning January 1, 1971 the minimum voting age for all federal elections will be 18.

However, the Court held that Congress does not have the power to enact a minimum voting age for state and local elections. As a result, New York's minimum voting age of 21 for state and local elections, including school district meetings and elections, (Education Law sections 2012 and 2603) remains in full force and effect, unless and until the State Legislature makes a change.

A concurrent resolution of the Senate and Assembly, amending section 1 of Article II of the State Constitution to change the minimum voting age from 21 to 18 for state and municipal elections was adopted by the Legislature at its 1970 session, and will be presented for the second time at the 1971

session. If passed in 1971 and approved by the electorate in November of 1971, this change would take effect on January 1, 1972. It should be noted, however, that this provision of the State Constitution does not apply to school district meetings and elections, which are governed entirely by the Education Law provisions referred to above. Those provisions can of course be changed at any session of the Legislature, and we will promptly advise you of any such change.

The Supreme Court also upheld that part of the federal act which provided that in presidential and vice-presidential elections no voter may be denied his right to cast a ballot because he did not live in the jurisdiction long enough to meet its residency requirements. Since this part of the federal act relates only to national elections, the three-month residency requirement for the 56 smaller city school districts is not affected by the federal act and remains in effect.

The Supreme Court further upheld those provisions of the 1970 Voting Rights Act Amendments which annulled all literacy test provisions of any kind in federal, state and local elections. This holding nullifies that part of Education Law section 2603, subdivision 3, paragraph a, which requires the ability to read and write English. (Section 2603 applies only to the 56 smaller city school districts.) The section is not otherwise affected.

REPORT ON POSSIBILITIES FOR EGONOMIES
FOR THE 1971-72 SCHOOL YEAR

The ravages of inflation causing increases in the price of all materials and services purchased by the school district continue seemingly unabated. At the same time the state and federal governments with broad-based taxing powers have failed to keep up or increase sufficiently their contribution to the cost of educating our youth. Add to these circumstances an increase in basic salary and in fringe benefits for all levels of employees and the picture for budget makers becomes bleaker.

The contribution of land owners to the cost of education in school districts increases inversely to the wealth of the district for all costs beyond the limit on which the state shares (\$860 per pupil for operating expenses). In other words, districts which can afford it the least must increase tax rate most sharply when the local district has to assume a larger burden of school costs. The sad part about this fact is that the poorest districts are often spending the least per pupil now on education and placing a heavier burden on them tends to make them lag still farther behind more affluent districts.

To illustrate the present status of the Beekmantown Central School District the following comparisons are made.

In the fall of 1969 Beekmantown had 124 classroom teachers for 2760 students or a ratio of 44.9 teachers per 1,000 students. At the same time the ratio for Clinton County as a whole was 48.26, for village superintendencies state wide it was 49.2 and for the whole state 51.2.

Total professionals per 1,000 students stood at 51.8 for Beekmantown, 56.17 for Clinton County, 57.95 for village superintendencies and 59.13 for New York State.

Expenditure figures in 1967-68 (last figures available) revealed that per pupil (WADA) Beekmantown spent \$666.45 for operating expenditures and \$897.98 for total expenditures, Clinton County \$703.01 and \$950.54, village superintendencies \$878.16 and \$1,098.69 and New York State \$829.29 and \$1,104.41.

A recent publication "Financial Data on the SCHOOLS a Digest" issued by Mr. Arthur Levitt, State Comptroller, indicates that Clinton County deviates 50% and over below the state average real property tax per enrolled student (\$552) and stand 20-29% above the state average (\$600) of state aid per student. A further comparison with state wide averages is made for expenditures for current operations per enrolled student and school tax rates. In the case of the former, Clinton County spends 10-14% less than the state wide average of \$1,106 per student while having tax rates which are from 0-9% below average.

The foregoing points out graphically the poor position in which the schools in this county and, more particularly, this school district, find themselves when one considers the economies that might be considered and the damage that such economies would have on the educational program.

As superintendent of this school district I can see few if any non-essentials to a good school program which are now in existence in our district. If anything, I can see many features which we lack and which should be added to the school program. The number of classroom teachers per 1,000 students is far too low. An additional administrative staff member or two are needed to care for the myriad details connected with a \$3.5 million enterprise. There should be department chairmen in the secondary school to stimulate curriculum development, to coordinate individual teacher efforts and to promote teacher self-improvement.

Further, the secondary school needs more elective courses to provide more student interest and flexibility in the program. The elementary schools need specialists in art. More help should be provided in the area of health and attendance for our schools which serve so many from disadvantaged homes. A system wide reading coordinator could do a great deal to improve our program.

The foregoing paragraphs do not in any way exhaust the list of needs of this school system. They only serve to draw the attention of the Board of Education to the relatively poor position in which we find ourselves in relation to staff and financial support of the educational program.

The minimum requirements for schools in New York are outlined in a publication from the State Education Department dated June 1970. Briefly, we are required to limit teacher loads in the secondary school to six teaching periods and a daily load limited to 150 pupils. Certain subjects are required to be taught. The details of these subjects are found in the bulletin referred to above. Any features of our schools not found there can be cut.

The choice of priorities in the school program differs from person to person. Professionals are not in agreement by any means as to which aspect of the program is most important. It follows then that laymen would not agree on what is most desirable and least desirable in our schools. The following are possible areas on which savings could be effected. They are not necessarily in order of priority because their priority should be set by the value placed on them by the Board, the public, the students and the professional staff.

- 1. Abolish the extra-curricular program.
- 2. Cut out the cafeteria or raise the price of meals to eliminate the need to subsidize the program.
- 3. Eliminate the positions of music teachers not needed for the required courses.
 - 4. Eliminate the driver education program.
 - 5. Eliminate the position of speech correctionist.
 - 6. Eliminate the position of school psychologist.
 - 7. Eliminate elementary physical education positions.
 - 8. Increase class loads for teachers through negotiation.
 - 9. Eliminate all conference expenses.
- 10. Hire a transportation supervisor instead of having the two separate positions of head bus driver and head mechanic.
 - 11. Provide transportation for legal limits only.
- 12. Eliminate one of the two periods of English for junior high school students.
 - 13. Eliminate French for the seventh and eighth grades.
 - 14. Do not provide for a planned balance in the budget.
 - 15. Eliminate the position of dental hygienist.
- l6. Obtain a student accident policy that will provide non-duplication and will have a deductible clause.
- 17. Reduce the working year of principals and guidance personnel.
 - 18. Do away with the adult education program.
 - 19. Reduce the work week of custodians to forty hours.

20. Set limits on expenditures for certain categories of the budget, e.g. supplies, textbooks, equipment, etc.

21. Reduce staffs of auxillary services like cafeteria, custodians, teacher aides and mechanics.

In summary, inflation continues to cause the cost of operating schools to soar. When the ceiling of costs in which the state shares does not rise, an inordinate burden is passed on to the school district and causes tax rates to climb. In order to cut costs or to keep rises in costs within certain bounds a question is posed as to which portions of the school program can be dispensed with. Because Beekmantown has a poorer teacher pupil ratio than the average for Clinton County, village districts, and New York State, because we spend less per pupil than the average of Clinton County, all village districts and New York state, and because of the relatively meager program which we are currently supporting in the schools, any cuts made are bound to adversely affect the quality of instruction. The twenty-one statements are listed as aspects of the program which could be considered if the Board of Education decides that it must curtail the program. The importance of any of these areas is not argued, but the superintendent strongly recommends that much discussion take place before a decision is made to reduce the program and that the specific choice or choices to be made be decided upon only after consultation with teachers, parents, students, and administrators.

Dear Mr. Saunders:

This is in reply to your letter of March 9, 1971.

This office will accept from participating agencies Monthly Report Forms PS-506 which show only one set of rates for their retired employees. The reason for this policy is that we are at present not geared to process more than one set of retiree rates per agency within the scope of our present operations.

In the event that an agency has contractual agreements which provide for different rates for retired groups, the lower of the employer share rates must be reported on the PS-506. To fulfill their agreement with the other group or groups, the agency has two alternatives. The first is to require the other group of retirees to remit retiree shares directly to the agency. The agency would then report this group on the PS-505 as active employees and remit the full share. The second alternative is to report the group on the PS-506 for the first group of retirees at the lesser employee share rate and the agency will refund the retiree share difference directly to the second group.

I can appreciate additional administrative work this makes for the participating agencies; however, present conditions bind us to this policy.

I do hope that this provides you with the information that you requested and if you have any further questions, please feel free to contact us again.

Miss Deming had visited the school and asked the School Nurse teachers to set Program Priorities. At the January meeting copies of these priorities were distributed to the Board.

our recent meeting Mrs. Rabideau and Mrs. Luck told us of Miss Demings disit to the school and we went over her letter to Dr. Saunders as a result of this visit. The list of priorities which the girls had prepared was also gone over point by point.

- l. While the first priority of a Health Office and additional school nurse for the elementary wing (to include West Chazy) was of real importance to the nurses, they realize there is no question of this at this time. No space and no budget being the realiztic reasons against it.
- 2. The nurses have had a little better than half time clerical help from Mrs. Breyette, up to the present, due to Mrs. Forkey being able to get along with less than half time from Mrs. Breyette. However, as of the first of February Mrs. Breyette will be needed at Cumberland Head and the nurses will have to share her time 50-50.
- 3. Fr. Saunders expressed his feelings again about the necessity of the Nurse Teachers spending some time on Health Education in the class rooms, especially in elementary. It was the opinion of the Nurse teachers that they could spend perhaps one or two days a month at this important job and bearesource and consultants the rest of the time with the class room teachers toing the Health Education.
- 4. The Nurse Teachers have been most appreciative of having Mr. Parnaby to assist in transporting children home. They would hope that this would continue.

Since it is mandated by the State that all pupils each year be given eye and ear tests and because there are many re-checks, this is a most time consuming aspect of their job. In many cases home visits are necessary and the girls spend the first part of the year getting their tests completed and therefor no Health Education has not as yet been started.

The state of the s

Mrs. Luck explained what went on in their office every day with attendance, phone calls, first aid etc. It was her opinion that at least 30 pupils a day come in to their office for one reason or another. She said Mrs. Breyette has been invaluable as she is willing to pitch in wherever needed. She does, typing, filing some screenin, minor first aid, signing passes, answering shone etc. She will be sorely missed now that her three half days (extra) which she has been spening at the Main Building, will have to be spent at Cumberland Head.

Before the meeting adjourned the nurses checked the hearing of all those present in order to show us just what was involved. They also showed us around their office.

RECCOMENDATION:

It was the unanimous opinion of the Committee that we need to make some arrangement now whereby Mrs. Breyette can spend full time at the Main Building. This would require either hiring a half time person for Cumberland Head from Feb. 1st on when she is needed and help for Mrs. Forkey on a two half days a week basis from September to Feb. 1st.

The Committee wishes to state that we are certainly fortunate to have such fine and dedicated people in these three nurses and siderally reccomends that at least this minimum additional help be provided.

The Committe also feels that long range plans should be discussed before the budget meetings.

TEACHER & CURRICULUM COMMITTEE REPORT ON REGENTS SCHOLARSHIP RESULTS

Present:

Mr. Glasgow presented some statistics showing positive correlations between IQ, N.E.D.T. scores, class averages, and Regents Scholarship examinations. Discussion was held on the statistics and their significance.

Predictions of probable winners for 1972 and 1973 were shown to the committee. These were on the basis of IQ, N.E.D.T. and general achievement. Mr. Glasgow stressed that these predictions are his own based on past experience.

Questions were raised regarding teacher demands on students. The administrators brought out the fact that life has changed and with it a change tends to have taken place regarding the gulf that used to exist between teachers and pupils. The questioning posture of students is now very noticeable.

There was discussion on attitudes of both students and teachers - longer dependency, laxity of application of statutes, etc.

School quality is judged by the public based on the number of Regents Scholarship winners because of the publicity connected with them. However, it was stated by Dr. Saunders that school quality needs precise measurements at various levels and such measurements are being developed by The State Education Department. Taken into account must be factors known to affect pupil achievement such as IQ, education of parents, etc.

The question of correlation between socio-economic status and scholarship winning was raised. It was pointed out that many children of low socio economic status used to succeed. Why is that not true today?

The achievement of some stems from family, some in spite of family, because of friends, and because of encouragement from faculty. The complexity of causes for academic success was discussed at length.

Points were made about the relative success of our graduates in college and of Beekmantown Central School's reputation among other teachers. Praise has been given as well as criticism.

Questions were raised by a board member. What improvements can be made to improve our program? What can the Board of Education do?

Space is one of the main problems which limits program even if the Board is willing to allow additional program. The superintendent will submit a report soom on the status of our program. There are features which we lack and which the Board must weigh before accepting them or rejecting them.

The question of whether help was received from data processing in regard to utilizing space was raised and answered affirmatively.

What motivation is engendered by such services as guidance? The staff is a dedicated one and sees a great number of youngsters per day. The encouragement of youngsters to reach for the stars was at length.

It was stated that students are fairly well prepared when they come to the secondary school. There is some retardation in mathematics but in general, high school courses are the equal of college courses of a few years ago and we should all realize that teachers and students must know and learn more than they ever did before.

COURSE OUTLINE

TITLE: Short Story

TEXT: Short Story: A Thematic Anthology
Scribner's

This semester length course will be an in-depth study of the short story. It will provide the student with a definition of the form and, from this definition, will attempt to develop the students as creative readers. This will be achieved by analyzing a group of approximately 30 stories taken from the text. These will be explored thematically, but each story will be examined as a separate example and theme will not be the primary concern. Rather, how to read the story, individual interpretation, and style will be emphasized.

The students will be required to read at least 20 stories of their own cloosing on their own time and submit this list at the end of the semester. These works will be included on each individual's final exam.

If time permits the course will also include an introduction to the writing of short stories. Students will submit their own compositions to the class for analysis and criticism. These stories will be based on a student notebook, kept by each individual, which is based on personal observation and experience.

OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To provide a definition for the short story.
- 2. To instill a knowledge of creative reading.
- 3. To introduce the student to quality literature.
- To instill an understanding of various writing styles and their effectiveness.
- 5. To instill a desire to read.
- 6. To provide the ability to accurately analyze a short story.
- 7. To provide an opportunity for the student to create a readable short story.
- To emphasize the importance of experience in achieving an understanding of life.

Snowmobile Safety Program

Required: All operators between the ages of 10 and 16 must complete a certified safety course by October 1st, 1971.

Description: Course consists of four, one hour, classes dealing with the Snowmobile Law and Safety. Completion of the course and a passing grade on a final exam allows the participant to operate a snowmobile on established trails. He specified requirements.

Materials and Responsibility: All materials and liability insurance are supplied by the State of New York through the Division of Parks and Recreation. Though no snowmobiles are required for adequate instruction, parental permission must be granted before any child may participate.

Instruction: This must be given by a certified safety instructor with assistance from volunteers for the purpose of collecting registration Cards, marking examinations, and preparing certificates.

Requests: After determining the number of students within the district desiring to take the course, I am asking for the use of the cafeteria for four evenings in late April and early May.

Cost: There will be no cost to the district as instruction is given without charge. As I have previously stated, all materials are provided by the state. The concern is to develop a program which can create an awareness for safety and a respect for the law in this rapidly growing winter pastime.

She was also interested in knowing if the City School District had presented a health service contract to the Board for the school year 1970-71. The was informed that they had, but the amount would not be paid until the ruling of the commissioner of Education was received on the recent hearing before him concerning the 1969-70 health service contract with the city school district.

Edward Rogers than addressed the Board and asked if the Board planned on getting out a "fact sheet" concerning the bus vote to be held April 29, 1971. He felt that a sheet gotten out to all district residents giving information relative to mileage on old buses to be replaced, cost of repair of old buses, amount of state aid that will be received toward the purchase of buses, number of buses to be retired from payment this year so people will know how much buses only will raise tax rate, etc. Dr. Saunders told Mr. Rodgers that a sheet similar to the one he described would be prepared and sent home by children on the buses.

He also mentioned the Transportation report made by the State Education Department in 1968. Because it mentioned that the district "may save from 12 to 15 buses if it staggered the school starting time." some people in the district were concerned that this hadn't been done. Superintendent Saunders informed those present that at the start of this school year the daily starting time had been staggered in the various buildings, but due to the much larger enrollment at the main building as compared to enrollment at Cumberland Head and West Chazy buildings, and transportation required for students attending city schools that it was impossible to save the 12 to 15 buses mentioned in the report. He stated that he had talked to Mr. Caruse from the education department and was told that the 12 to 15 buses mentioned in the report was an arbitrary figure and would not necessarily apply in every situation.

Kenneth Mills suggested that maybe problems are caused due to a lack of communication and thought that maybe another meeting before the vote would be a good idea. Mrs. Fogarty stated that she felt that too much pressure is put on voters to persuade them how to vote and that the Board should not necessarily take a stand for or against items that are being placed before the taxpayers.
